accounting of fatal accidents among transplant teams is important for the entire transplant community, although it is difficult to assemble due to the absence of a worldwide clearinghouse for this information. Based on the clarification and additional data you have provided, we offer this updated table of fatal organ procurement accidents. We invite all readers to contact us directly if we have omitted any other fatal events.

We welcome your suggestions to improve organ procurement travel safety and hope they are embraced by the transplant community. Similar recommendations were made by the Michigan Donor Travel Forum, which was convened in March 2009. This forum represented a multidisciplinary workgroup focused on improving organ procurement practices, efficiency and safety in the United States. The proceedings of the forum will be published in an upcoming issue of the *American Journal of Transplantation*.
