A university achieves greatness through its people... through their talents and abilities... their involvement and commitment... But it is important to recognize that the "community" that comprises a university extends far beyond its students. faculty, and staff... Rather this community extends outward... beyond our ivy-covered walls to embrace our alumni and friends... it also extends backward in time...to include that long line of maize and blue that have build and sustained the distinction of this University... I might even suggest that this community extends into the future...through those families...many of them already associated with the University.. that will produce the students and faculty for this institution in years to come A key factory in the strength of the University ... active involvement by alumni Not just for financial support... although you can expect to hear from us even more frequently Not just for your efforts in directing outstanding students to Ann Arbor -- many of them your own children or grandchildren...
