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

These *Want Ads* reinforce two truisms that are worth thinking about from time to time. A great deal of the fine reputation that the Law School enjoys results from the reflection of the individual reputations and successes of our alumni. Thus, we think it important that news of the happenings in your lives be recorded, shared, and reported. With your help, we can do some of this through the pages of the *Law Quadrangle Notes*, and particularly with the "Annual Report" issue. We really do want to know what's going on out in the real world. Information about other alumni, as well as yourself, will be equally welcome. We hope to hear from many of you.

The second truism is that a *LOT* of people put in a *LOT* of time and effort to make sure that the Fund continues to go and to grow. It does not just "happen." A very substantial part of the work and planning that is required is contributed by members of the National Committee and by the rest of the *TEAM* of volunteers who serve in a variety of roles. The names of more than 300 of the principal members of the *TEAM* for 1974 are listed elsewhere in this report, with either the summary of the year's activities by geographic area or by class. Beyond this imposing list are several hundred other alumni—some known to us, but many others not even identified—who work as local solicitors. If you have not tried it before, won't you join us in 1975? We think you will find it exciting to be involved.

To every member of the 1974 *TEAM*, thank you and congratulations on a job well done!

TOPS

The Fund had a *very good* year in 1974—in fact, the *very best year* in its 14 years. This would be noteworthy in any case, but in an economically distressing year as 1974 has been it speaks even more strongly of the recognition by you of the importance of private support for the Law School to enable it to maintain its position as one of the truly great law schools of the world. We are grateful that so many of you helped to make it so.

What does being "*TOPS*" really mean? Lists, boxes, and graphs throughout the report spell out the fact for 1974. But it also means that in 1974:

- (1) More dollars were received than in any previous year, and
- (2) The Fund received more gifts
- (3) From more donors than in any previous year (some donors do contribute more than once so the figures are not identical),
- (4) More *alumni* participated in 1974 than ever before, and
- (5) The *percentage* of participating alumni (perhaps the most critical statistic) reached a new high—40.9%. This in spite of a rapidly increasing *base number* resulting from large graduating classes in recent years and our considerable success in "finding" lost alumni.

THIS IS WONDERFUL!

We are still concerned, however, about *LYBUNTS*—those who gave *Last Year But Not This*. There were 597 alumni (not counting those who died) that participated in 1973 who did not repeat in 1974. As a matter of fact this group constituted the *lowest percentage of LYBUNTS* that we have recorded; we suppose that this can be

considered a success for 1974, but is obvious there is still room for substantial improvement.

COMPARISONS

Elsewhere in this report you will find a Comparison by Regions for 1973 and 1974. This is impressive because it shows that the warmth and strength of our alumni and the support that we received from so many of you is broad-based. Twelve of fifteen regions show an increase in the number of gifts over 1973, and ten of the fifteen had more dollars.

Still another interesting statistic—not shown in a table—is the *change in the distribution of gifts* from the small to the large. The distribution as it was in 1974 is shown in the report. However, it does not show that the *number of gifts* (and dollars contributed) in the top six categories—\$25 and up—increased substantially over 1973, and the *number of gifts* in each of the three categories below \$25 decreased. This trend with minor exceptions, has been taking place since 1969.

To try and point out specific areas or classes that showed the strongest gain is risky business because of such wide differences in size, numbers, and previous levels of participation but a few noteworthy accomplishments would surely include:

- (1) The number of "\$1,000 Cities" increased from 54 to 56.
- (2) For the first time a class had 100% participation. Both surviving members of the Class of 1899 Law were contributors in 1974. God bless you both.
- (3) The Class of 1949, always a strong participating class, celebrated its Silver Anniversary and increased its total gifts in 1974 by 76%. In addition, three members of that class also *pledged* a total of \$11,600 to be paid over three years.
- (4) For the fourth straight year South Carolina had a gift from every alumnus in the state.
- (5) The number of gifts from '71 Law increased 40%; for 1973 the increase in numbers was 74% and in dollars a whopping 170%.
- (6) The District of Columbia, with more than 400 alumni showed an increase of 21% in the number of gifts and a 36% increase in dollars.

Other results and the leaders in a variety of categories are listed throughout the report. Our congratulations to all of you.

GIFTS-IN-KIND

It is not uncommon to receive gifts of securities in lieu of cash, but these are usually sold and the proceeds are reflected *continued, page 9*

Dear Ted:

Enclosed is a detailed report on the 1974 Law School Fund Campaign. Frankly, in view of last year's economic difficulties, I was relieved to find that we managed to set new highs in total amount contributed, number of contributions and, most heartening of all, in proportion of alumni contributing.

I say "we" advisedly, because it is the hundreds of alumni who donate their time and effort in behalf of the Fund that make this happen. Perhaps the most striking evidence of its alumni's appreciation of the Law School is the ease with which we get substantial infusions of new blood each year into the Fund's activities.

As for record setting, I hasten to point out that we set a new high in contributions by only \$811, which doesn't even round up to 1%. In a world of escalating costs, that is not really moving forward. It's gratifying to report that the total of \$416,833 is unmatched by any other public law school, but not satisfying. To remain in the very top rank of all national law schools, we need to do better.

And I can't think of a better choice to lead this effort than our new National Chairman, Sam Krugliak, who will bring to bear a wit, energy and enthusiasm which I envy.

And, like myself, he'll find that working with you, Roy Proffitt and his people is a delight.

Dear Mal:

Overcoming the dual obstacles of a slumping economy and the increasing preoccupation of many alumni with our proposed capital campaign, you have finished off your two years as National Chairman of the Law School Fund with a performance that broke every record on the books. As you have indicated, the \$416,833 collected, the 4993 gifts received, the total of 4670 contributors, and the 40.9 percent of alumni contributing were all new highs in the fourteen-year history of the Fund. Congratulations and heart-felt thanks from all of us at the Law School.

You speak of the "hundreds of alumni who donate their time and effort in behalf of the Fund," and surely you are right about how much this means in itself, and how much it says about the alumni's appreciation of the Law School. But I must add that you have been entirely too modest about your own personal role in all this. The speed with which you put together an outstanding national organization was a wonder to behold. Beyond that, you were a tower of strength in countless ways for me and the Law School throughout the past two years.

The automobile-based economy of the State of Michigan is in its worst shape in recent years. Despite our current almost-unprecedented inflation, there is every possibility of a University budget cut in 1975-76. Should that occur, an even heavier strain would be placed on our private moneys to provide utterly essential financial aid to our students, and to maintain the excellence of our academic program. For anyone in my office in times like these, it is reassuring beyond words to know that there stands behind the Law School a band as loyal and dedicated as the Michigan alumni. We may have to trim our sails a bit, but with the help of persons like you and all our other many friends, I know we shall ride out the storm.

Again, thank you, Mal, and all our best wishes for exciting new challenges and satisfying new accomplishments in the "second career" that awaits you following your retirement from Ford.



in the cash figures that we report. This year we received a few gifts of real value, but a little less marketable than typical securities, and which are not included elsewhere in the report. One handsome gift was an undivided share in 192 acres of land in Texas. We also received a collection of antique guns. The donors' instructions are that the proceeds be used for the Law School Library. Another alumnus conveyed a number of cemetery lots to the University for the benefit of the Law School. And we received two long-term State of Israel bonds which we shall hold to maturity.

NON-ALUMNI GIFTS

In 1974 the Fund received gifts totaling \$110,179.06 from non-alumni. Many are sent as memorial gifts (see details in another part of the report), and a substantial number are from companies and law firms with "matching gifts" programs. A few other very substantial gifts come through charitable foundations and trusts where our alumni have a role in advising the directors or trustees; and from time to time we receive a gift from an alumnus' individual client who wishes to make a charitable contribution, and on the advice of the alumnus, considers the Law School Fund a worthy recipient. Perhaps you, too, represent a foundation, a trust, or other client that would appreciate knowing more about the Law School Fund.

Some of these bequests provided new student scholarship or student loan funds, the others permitted the money to be used within the discretion of the dean. These gifts are not reported with any other figures and statistics in the report because they were not the result of a donative intent in 1974, and because we thought the addition of the amount of the proceeds to the annual giving campaign would distort the direct results of that campaign.

These bequests serve as reminders of the truth and applicability of a statement published by one of our sister law schools to show the inter-relationship of its annual

giving program and bequests to the school: "Annual giving to the Fund has improved steadily—but death terminates annual giving, and annual givers must become testators who remember the Law School in their wills."

Michigan Benefactors

This is a personal recognition awarded those individuals, corporations or foundations who by their major gifts to the University of Michigan permit the institution to implement facilities, programs, and services that enable it to maintain leadership among the universities of the world. Basic qualifications for such recognition is a gift of \$100,000 in cash, or \$150,000 in the form of a deferred gift.

Michigan Income Tax Credit

During 1974 we again were able to assure alumni whose income is subject to the Michigan Income Tax that their gifts to the LAW SCHOOL or LAW SCHOOL FUND, DO QUALIFY FOR THE LIMITED CREDIT PROVISION IN SECTION 260 OF THE MICHIGAN INCOME TAX STATUTE.

As a matter of fact, by Public Act 281 of 1974, enacted late in 1974 but retroactively effective for the entire year, the basic limitation that gifts would qualify for the credit only if they were in a form considered by the Department of the Treasury as being made to the "general fund" of the University was removed.

Thus, without trying to get too technical here (obviously you will want to look at the statute) this meant (and means) that within the limitations of the Act the taxpayer can receive *credit* equal to 50 per cent of the aggregate amount of charitable contributions made by him to institutions of higher learning located within Michigan.


The section still provides that the credit cannot exceed 20 per cent of what would otherwise have been the Michigan Income Tax or \$100, whichever is less for a single person, or in the case of a husband and wife filing a joint return as provided in section 311, \$200, assuming again this sum does not exceed 20 per cent of what would otherwise have been the tax.

There is little doubt that many of our alumni took advantage of this tax credit provision to increase their contribution (or in some cases to make their initial contribution) to the Law School Fund. Many more of you can do the same. Since these charitable gifts also qualify as deductions on your Federal returns (as contrasted to the Michigan *credit*) it means that many of you can make a substantial gift to the Fund, up to \$200 or to \$400 if you file a joint return, without a very large increase in your cash outlay.

Regardless of what you feel you can give, the happy fact is that for those of you subject to the Michigan Income Tax, you can increase the pleasure of your gift to the Law School Fund by the knowledge that you can "recover" a part of it through the Tax Credit allowance.

The Hundred Club

Those who contribute \$100 or more to the University or one of its schools, departments, or colleges during a calendar year are considered participants in The Hundred Club. This certainly includes gifts to the Law School Fund. Continuous membership can be informally established when a gift objective at this level is accepted by the donor(s) for successive years. A membership card is issued annually and special recognition is made in each *Honor Roll* edition. For those interested, Radrick Farms Golf Course in Ann Arbor is open to all Hundred Club members upon presentation of the personal membership card and payment of green fees. The main purpose of The Hundred Club is to provide tangible evidence of strong University support and offer an incentive for others to follow. We would like to have you join with your gift to the Law School Fund.



Corporate Matching Gift Program

Do you work for a company that has a matching gift program? If you do, your

gift to the Law School Fund can usually be matched dollar for dollar by your company. All you need to do is obtain a matching gift form from your employer, fill it out, and send it to us with your dona-

tion to the Law School Fund. It will be processed here, returned to your company, and your gift will become doubly valuable.


