Community Development in Villa El Salvador, Perú

Agency: Los Martincitos hosts 145 members, most of whom are at least 65 years old and have been relegated to living their advanced years in destitution. The program provides nutritious meals to the seniors three times a week, along with basic medical care, classes, activities and a sense of community. This program is sponsored by Cross Cultural Solutions, a US based non-profit organization.





Location: Villa El Salvador is a community that has become a model for urban and social development in Peru. It was founded in 1971 due to a massive relocation of 7,000 families by the Peruvian government. Today, the shantytown is self-managed but is still in dire need of many social services. It has also been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize.

I am already halfway through my trip and can't imagine how difficult it will to be to leave my abuelo friends. They have made a deep impact on how I view life and how content I feel with my current situation. Sometimes I feel like social work is not even a career. It is a way of life.
