LOCATION: Nicaragua, Catarina

Nicaragua is the largest country in Central America. According to the World Bank its population was of 6.15 millions by 2016. Spanish is the official language, however in the Autonomous Regions other languages are spoken including *Garífuna*, *Rama*, *English Creole*, *Miskito*, *Guatuso*, and so forth. Tourism is considered the second largest industry in Nicaragua. Catarina, the city I was placed is located in the department of Masaya. Its population is of 8,350 including urban and rural areas.

Community Partner

El Puente COOP is composed of 22 members including women, men, youth and elders. I worked directly with all members and their families. Also, I worked indirectly with local partner institutions including public school, library, Baptist church. The COOP aims to enhance professional and creative skills by fostering cooperativism values that promote sustainability.





Global Independent Study Goals

This course enhanced my SW practice from a global perspective with focus in utilizing the *Critical Intersectionality* framework to analyze the intersection of gender, mestizaje, class & their relation to power as the barriers to social justice goals.

- Planned an exchange visit for partnership building with CEPROSI a grassroots nonprofit in Nindirí

Skills Utilized

- Cultural Humility was a key competency that allowed me to immerse in the community. It was the people there who taught me about their culture, I simply listened intentionally.
- Assessment & Evaluation based on their priorities I developed an assessment as an evaluative process that would support their long term goals.
- Consciousness-Raising was a daily practice.

Lessons Learned

- Practice *humility* by taking time to be immerse and let people teach you about their life and collective memory
- Flexibility is important as context and cultural values varies making processes to move at different pace
- *Prevent assumptions* by understanding your reactions to observations as part of the learning process and say "I don't know" when you don't
