George Frideric Handel Concerto Grosso, op. 6, no. 7 in B-flat Major; George Frideric Handel Messiah: Behold the Lamb of God, He was despised, and Lift up your heads, O ye gates; Johann Sebastian Bach Cantata no. 4 Christ lag in Todesbanden, BWV 4.

Third Dissertation Recital: Sunday, November 30, 2014, Hill Auditorium, University of Michigan. Darius Milhaud *Neuf Préludes pour Grand Orgue*; Olivier Messiaen *L'Ascension pour Orgue*.
