APPENDIX B RELIGION CODING SCHEME

The coding scheme for religious preference used in 1987 is an expanded version of Lenski's original 1958 code. The new code is based on the denomination affiliations mentioned by the 20,000 respondents of the GSS survey between 1972 and 1986. The scheme is an attempt to organize the large number of small and unordered religious groups into manageable categories, and to see the emergent liberal, moderate, and fundamentalist pattern in American religion. Three sources were used to organize the predominantly Protestant groups into sixteen categories: Frank Mead's Handbook of Denominations in the United States, Gordon Melton's The Encyclopedia of American Religions, and an unpublished technical memo Classifying Protestant Denominations by Tom Smith.

The division of religious denominations listed in the GSS 1972-1986 Cumulative Codebook reflects a two-tiered sifting of the affiliations mentioned. The first is an organization by broad denominational groupings (i.e. Baptist, Mormon, Fundamentalist, Catholic, Jew, etc.) forming a twenty category list. Each of these twenty categories were further divided to identify the groups falling within each broad grouping and to reflect the theological variations within these bodies. The list in this form represents sixteen categories for the 129 Protestant denominations, plus four general categories for Jewish, Catholic, Other and No affiliations (see Appendix A).

The level of detail offered by the GSS categorization is too extensive for the DAS coding scheme but it provides an effective template for a less detailed code. Because the GSS list includes

every religious affiliation mention, the three to seven frequently mentioned groups for each discrete body in the GSS survey have their own code in the DAS scheme. The less frequently mentioned GSS affiliations are listed in the "other" category for each body. It was necessary to create a new code for the Unity Church, a denomination which was infrequently mentioned in the GSS survey, but exhibited a higher representation in the Detroit area.

The new code attempts to offer more detail within each major denominational division and to categorize religious affiliation by theology rather than by historical era, as done by Gerard Lenski. Using historical categories does not take into consideration the contemporary fact that the development of new religious groups, and the divisions and mergers of old religious groups occur within and across traditional denominational groupings. It is true that history may impact on the relative conservatism of particular faiths which grow out of a specific period but it would not be accurate to assume that theology is determined by historical influences solely. The use of historical eras offers a convenient method of grouping religious faiths, but does not facilitate interpretation. The use of historical eras does not create meaningful categories for the interpretation of the impact of theology. It is our belief that the 1987 coding scheme will enhance interpretation on the basis of theology.

The advantage of a theologically based code can be seen clearly in the following example. The Methodists can be seen as having internal groups that represent a range of theological variation from liberal to fundamentalist. The Lenski code

provides two codes for Methodists: 29 Methodist, 30 African Methodist Episcopal, in the Pietistic category. While this is helpful in understanding the contemporary development of Methodist, Baptist, and the Brethren sects (all of which emerged during the Pietistic period), it does not represent the relative liberal nature of the United Methodist church, moderate theology of the African Methodist Episcopal church, or the fundamentalist leanings of the Free or Pilgrim Methodists. The 1987 coding scheme assigns a code to each of the groups. The use of multiple categories maintains the range of theological variation within a leading to body.

Our questionnaire addresses the fact that some members of what have been historically defined as Protestant denominations do not consider themselves Protestants. The use of a subjective and objective code for the respondent's religious preference allows both pieces of information to be coded. The objective code has been described up to this point. It is based on conventional grouping of denominations into larger categories of religious faith (Protestant, Catholic, Jewish, Other, and None). The subjective code concerns itself only with Protestant denominations. The information is provided by the respondent about his/her understanding of the religious category (Protestant or Other) into which their particular denominational affiliation falls. In an interview we ask directly "Do you consider this to be a Protestant denomination?" in order to determine whether the respondent has simply neglected to mention the Protestant

affiliation or believed that the particular faith was <u>not</u>
Protestant (questions C5 and C6).

The use of a subjective and objective code, the development of this code from an on-going national survey, and the theological orientation of this scheme all suggest that this is an inclusive and useful coding system. This coding scheme contains all of the information in Lenski's code, but additional detail and refinement facilitate analysis of the impact of religious affiliations on individual behavior. Because of its history as a nation of religious diversity, an attempt must be made to consolidate the many religious groups that exist in the United States without losing their variations. The use of this code organizes the many groups into broader categories of religious orientation, while retaining the theological variation within and among groups. This level of detail will allow the researcher to choose a level of specificity appropriate to the analysis desired.

-- Notes --

1. Variation in theology is examined extensively in Tom Smith's unpublished technical memo <u>Classifying Protestant</u>

<u>Denominations</u>. In determining the theological diversity among groups Smith compared other classifying schemes, noted interchurch association affiliations, i.e. National Council of Christian Churches, etc., interviewed laity and clergy, and consulted standard denomination reference works. It is his comparative work which was used primarily to evaluate the theological affiliations of Detroit area religious groups.
