This study is stored for archival purposes at ISR in card form (cabinet #84, drawers #1-4) and on two ISR Tapes: #1375 and back-up #1351. The tape file has the following header card DETROIT AREA STUDY 938 1965-66 STRATIFIED ASSOCIATION. Tape and card versions are identical, but the stored cards also include additional Deck One cards (grouped separately and labeled IA in the drawer) for "No Eligible Respondent (white only) as well as for completed interviews; the tapes include only completed interviews.

Identification: Project No. 928 is punched in Cols. 1-3; Deck No. is punched in Cols. 4-5; Interview No. is punched in Cols. 6-9.

Number of Records (Interviews)

There are 985 interviews, numbered consecutively from 0001 through 0985. In addition, 28 of these cases have been double-weighted (see Final Sampling Memorandum, DAS-938, January 15, 1967,) by adding to all tape and card versions 28 physical duplicates; these duplicates are identical to their respective originals except in Col. 6 of all decks, where a "l" rather than a "0" is punched to allow separate identification. (Col. 80 of Deck 6 also differs as explained below.) These 28 records added to the original 985 give a total of 1013 records for DAS 958. For most purposes all 1018 records will be used, so that the sample is properly weighted. The weighting is discussed in the Final Sampling Memorandum noted above.

In order to allow punched weighting as well as physical duplication, an additional procedure has been followed. Deck 6, Col. 80 is punched with the following weight factor:

0 Physical duplicates N=28 0 Original cases of duplicates N=28

All other cases N=957

Total 1,013

There are 12 decks, numbered 01 to 11 and 20. (Dack 20 is a special recoding of all occupational data.). These decks are in marged form (blocked at 12) on all tapes, and in unwarged form on cards. There is a code book for each of the 12 decks, with a separate general table of contents and correction sheet (copy attached to this memorandum).

Total number of Caras

There are 11 decks, with 1,013 cards (or card images) in each. Thus there are 11, 143 cards containing data.

Special Problems

There are no missing cards.

There is no multiple punching (more than one punch per column).

All punching is numberic (1-9; 0) except for Deck 10, Col's. 47-63, where a is used to maintain consistency with previously gathered fertility data.

Col's. 64-76 of the Deck 10 code book (machine averaging of fertility data) are not punched on the DAS cards and tapes.

Col's. 47-63 of Deck 10 contain blanks for missing data, but otherwise there should be no blanks in columns containing data.

Other Technical Memoranda:

Memoranda have been written on Final Sampling Procedures for this study (January 15, 1967), Closed Coding (November 30, 1966) Open Coding (December 15, 1966), and Origin of Questions Used in DAS 938 (January 15, 1967). A paper on interviewer effects will be available at a later point.

Interview Schedule

One schedule was used for all respondents. It consists of three separate parts: A single cover sheet, the main interview schedule, and a 4-page self-administered questionnaire filled out by the respondent mid-way in the interview. There is also a specially written Instruction Booklet for Interviewers dealing with sampling and questionnaire problems peculiar to the 938 study.

Use of the Data

-Use of these data prior to January, 1972, requires the permission of E.O.Laumann and H. Schuman. After January, 1972, permission can be obtained through the Executive Committee of the Detroit Area Study; such use of the data should acknowledge the role of the Detroit Area Study and of Drs. Laumann and Schuman.

The following questions were included in the P.938 questionnaire for primary use by the person named:

Ronald Freedman - Q's. 118-123D Thomas F. Pettigrev - Q's. 66-69 James Q. Wilson - Q's. 4-7, 63-65

Use of these data is permitted after January, 1972, with acknowledgment to the individual concerned. All questionnaire data on occupational status was initially coded and then specially recoded (see Deck 20) under the general supervision and for the primary use of Otis D. Duncan; any later extensive use of such data should make appropriate acknowledgment.

### Appendix to DECK 11

### Procedure for coding ethnic connotation of R's name

### 1. <u>Individual Coding of Names</u>

- a) Each name will be coded independently by seven coders using the nationality codes in Deck 11, cols. 66-67. Coders should code a specific country if they feel they have better than a fifty-fifty chance of being right. Otherwise they should code a general area. If they cannot code a general area with a fifty-fifty chance of being right they should code "don't know".
- b) There will be 21 coders in all. Each person will be randomly assigned to Group A, B, or C. Each group will code one third of the names, plus 20 more at random from the following groups as a reliability check.

### 2. Final Code Sums, Cols. 66-67):

A unique final code will be assigned to each name according to the following rules:

- a. Code a country if 4 out of 7 agree on the country, or if 3 out of 7 agree on the country and at least one other agrees on the general area or gives a different country within the same area.
- b. Code a general area if the above is not satisfied, but 4 out of 7 agree on the general area or give countries within the same general area.
- c. Code "don't know" if there is no agreement of 4 or more coders on the general area. (Unless disagreement involves either Jewish or American).
- d. Code "German Jewish" if 4 out of 7 say Jewish and at least 3 say German Jewish or German. (e.g., two say Jewish, 2 say German Jewish, and one says German with two odd responses)
- e. Code English when there is a disagreement between English and American and neither has 4, but both together have 4 or more.

## 3. Index of Inconsistency of Name Coding. (Cols 68-69)

This is a measure of the extent of disagreement among the seven persons who coded the names for ethnic connotation. A high score (maximum is 12) indicates high disagreement as to ethnic connotation. A low score (minimum is 0) indicates agreement among coders.

Points are assigned on the following basis:

- 1 point if same area, but different on no county
  2 points if different or no area
- a) Where an agreed-upon county was determined according to rules on Coding Sums (above), the final choice is the base from which the deviation is calculated.

### Appendix

- b) If an area but no country was agreed upon, use most frequently chosen country within the area as the base for calculating deviations. If there is no country chosen within the agreed upon area (e.g., 4 same area choices and 3 don't knows or countries outside area) use an "area" as the base for calculating the deviation score. (e.g., 40, 40, 40, 40, 98, 98, 21 as choices is scored with the base "40" and 9 as a deviation score).
- c) If no country or area was agreed upon, use the most frequently chosen country on the total list as a base. If no country was chosen twice, and there are a country and an area containing that country chosen, use this country as a base. If none of the above apply and there are two same area codes, use one as a base.
- d) If none of the above (a-c) apply (e.g., there are seven with no overlap or there are seven "don't knows") take any one choice as base.
- e) If agreed upon area is "Jewish" (or country in "Jewish area", count German and Eastern European as within same area.
- f) N.A. names receive a deviation score of "99".

- 1. A two-digit score of SES Index with values from low to high indicating rising status, except for codes 97, 98, and 99.
- 2. A three-digit 1965 NORC prestige score with values from low to high indicating rising prestige. The terminal digit denotes tenths of a unit (e.g. 30.1). Codes 997, 998, and 999 violate the correspondence between magnitude of score and prestige level.
