Dear Dean Allen:

It has been my great pleasure to serve as National Chairman of the University of Michigan Law School Fund during the 1969 campaign—a pleasure which was certainly enhanced by the results of the campaign. For the eighth successive year the Fund has shown a substantial increase over the previous year. Total gifts in 1969 were 4,302 as compared to 3,760 in 1968 and the total dollar amount was \$283,683.29 as compared to \$233,339.31 in 1968. These figures were not precisely comparable because the 1969 results included, for the first time, contributions to the \$55 Million campaign. However, this affects total gifts by only 74 and total dollars by only about \$11,000.

The success of the campaign, I feel, is due in large measure to the efforts of past National Chairmen in building a fine organization, most of which I inherited from Benjamin M. Quigg, Jr., the 1968 National Chairman. For the rest, the credit belongs to the many Regional, State and Local Chairmen and to the even more numerous solicitors and class agents who have surpassed their own previous efforts or those of their predecessors.

The "theme" of the Law School Fund has been "to assure that extra margin to keep Michigan in the ranks of the great schools". I am sure I speak for all members of the National Committee in saying that the law faculty has demonstrated in a visible manner that the moneys in the Fund have always been utilized to further this objective. Furthermore, we know that you and other members of the faculty will continue to use the Fund moneys to assure our great Law School that extra margin.

I am looking forward to serving as National Chairman for the 1970 campaign. I might conclude by saying that many of the Regional Chairmen have volunteered their expectation that, as well as they have done in 1969, they will do even better in 1970.


In the ninth year of its history the University of Michigan Law School Fund under your able Chairmanship exceeded the quarter-million mark. This constitutes a real landmark. On behalf of the faculty and students of the School, I express our deep gratitude for your splendid leadership, and for the dedicated assistance and support of all those who were active in the 1969 campaign and to all of those who supported the campaign with contributions.

The one fact that more than any other has characterized the University of Michigan Law School in the past has been its dedication to quality and excellence. This dedication has not been compromised, and I am confident will not be lost in the future. These are tumultuous times on University campuses across the country. The times provide distractions that could constitute a threat to the School's devotion to academic and professional excellence. This has not occurred. The overall quality of the students has never been higher. In my judgment, the demands made upon the students by the faculty have never been more rigorous and intense. In addition, the School has moved (as it must) to respond to the new needs created by the difficult period in which we find ourselves. There has, therefore, been change. 

Reading Between the Sheets



BINGO!

You did it again! For the ninth straight year the Fund has continued its steady growth. The easiest way to see this happy fact is to look at the graph elsewhere in this report. The 1969 campaign saw new records in nearly every category—more dollars, more gifts, more alumni contributors, more non-alumni contributors, etc. The total dollars received were \$283,683.29, an increase over the previous high of a whopping 21.6 per cent. There were 3,965 donors, 12.1 per cent more than a year ago. These figures are modified only slightly by the fact that in 1969, for the first time, payments on pledges to the \$55 Million Program designated for the Law School were deposited into the Law School Fund, and those dollars are shown here. (In past years the names only of these donors were listed.) The total of these pledge payments was \$10,931.91 from 66 donors. Thus, if you want to be a purist, you could say that gifts to the Fund's Annual Giving Program increased only 17 per cent, and the number of donors a mere 10.2 per cent. We could go on, but it is abundantly clear that whichever figures you use, the Fund was in good health and in good hands in 1969. We are appreciative of your generosity and you may be proud of your accomplishment.

PARTICIPATING PARTNERS

We think that the surest way to measure the success of an annual giving program for alumni, such as the Law School Fund, is to see how many, and what percentage of the alumni are actually taking part. Growth in this respect has obvious relevance to the health of the Fund, but it is also indicative of the enthusiasm of the alumni for the School in other important ways. Happily, in the last three campaigns (we won't confuse you with more ancient history) the number of alumni donors has moved from 3,121 (1967) to 3,332 (1968) and to a new high of 3,733 in 1969. This is great! Keep it going that way!

Percentage of participation is harder. It is almost impossible to KNOW how many alumni we have at any one time. One reason is that approximately 25 per cent of you will move your offices each year, and frequently you forget to tell us. When that happens you may be "lost" for some period of time. And, of course, to whatever figures we use as a base, we know

We know you are busy people, so herein we shall try to point out some of the noteworthy conclusions that can be gleaned from the details of the following pages, and we shall also make a few comparisons that are not available without access to facts and figures from previous years.

there will be deletions and additions during the course of the year because of deaths and new graduates.

The net effect of large graduating classes in recent years, and hard and imaginative detective work by the office staff, has been a rather rapidly expanding base of "good" addresses—e.g. from 8,700 in 1966 to 9,739 in 1969. Thus, in spite of the steadily increasing numbers of alumni donors, the change in *percentage* is less spectacular than one might suppose. But even with this increasing base the percentage of alumni participation in 1969 jumped 3.5 per cent and reached a new high of 38.3 per cent.

What is the ULTIMATE goal of the National Committee? It is to have EACH alumnus make SOME contribution to the Fund. Yes, sir, 100 per cent! This may be a *little* more than we can realistically expect, but other schools with similar programs have reached 50 and 60 per cent. The Michigan alumni can and should do as well.

WHERE THE ACTION WAS

On a geographic basis it is fair to say that there was action everywhere. Everyone of the 14 regions had more gifts this year than in 1968. That will be a tough record to beat. On the dollar side, all regions but three showed an increase. We congratulate and express our thanks to all of the Regional Chairmen and their respective teams.

For the first time two states had 100 per cent participation. South Carolina had been within one a year ago, and this year Phil Wittenberg (as predicted) went all the way. You probably guessed it—the other state hitting 100 per cent was Alaska again under the gentle urging of Victor Carlson. Twice in a row, Vic; it is great. Two other states, New Hampshire (N. Michael Plaut) and Hawaii (Roy Takushi), had contributions from more than 76 per cent of the alumni living there. What other state is ready to give these leaders a race?

A few areas that had impressive gains over the past year are: Connecticut, Monroe County, New York, the District of Columbia, Tennessee, Kansas, and Washington, each of which more than doubled the total contributions from that area. Oklahoma, under Richard Wills, tripled its dollars. Two states and a part of a state—Maryland (Larry Meyer and Herb Brown), Oregon (Jon Peele), and Northeast Pennsylvania (William Cassebaum)—more than doubled both dollars and the number of gifts. Region XII, which is comprised of Western and Northern Michigan and populated by nearly 1,200 alumni, showed remarkable gains for a large area. The number of gifts increased 16 per cent, and the dollars jumped an amazing 79 per cent over 1968, and passed all previous high-water marks for that region. Walter Freihofer was the chairman, and he had strong help from Jim Stariha, Kent Vana, T. Michael Doyle, and Bill Wisner in four key counties—Muskegon, Kent, Ingham, and Jackson.

Elsewhere in this report we have a summary of activity by classes. From that point of view, once again we

find that the substantial portion of the action was in more recent classes. Since these have been large classes it is not surprising (but it is gratifying) that in raw numbers more than one-third of all of the alumni donors are from the classes 1959 through 1969. It is more impressive that the percentage of participation from nine of these eleven classes exceeded the national average of 38.4 per cent. John Galanis brought the participation of the Class of 1963 to a record high of 170—or 50 per cent of the class. This put 1963 in first place in both of these important categories. Last, but not least, slightly more than 50 per cent of the 401 alumni who were new contributors to the Fund this year came from these eleven classes.

We are happy and proud to recognize these accomplishments, and we congratulate the members of these classes and their Class Agents, whose names are shown in the Class Summary.

Our enthusiasm for the foregoing should not blind us to other noteworthy accomplishments. Not all of the action was in these most recent classes. The Class of 1938, with Robert Curran in his first year as Class Agent, moved to the top of the list for total class contributions and also for the highest average contribution for any class. Several of the not-so-young classes increased the percentage of their participation beyond 40 per cent, with both 1929 (Cal Souther) and 1952 (Burton L. Ansell) reaching 46 per cent. These classes tied for third spot in this important category.

We do not intend to suggest that improvement such as we have described here is automatic and easy—rather the opposite. We *do intend to suggest* that where there is a will (and a little imagination) there is a way. Won't you help prove this as 1970 moves into high gear?

NON-ALUMNI GIFTS

In 1969 the Fund received gifts totaling \$82,135.90 from 232 non-alumni. Many are sent as memorial gifts (see details in another part of the report), and a substantial number are from companies with "matching gift" programs. A few other very substantial gifts come through charitable foundations and trusts where our alumni have a role in advising the directors or trustees, and from time to time we receive a gift from an alumnus' individual client who wishes to make a charitable contribution, and on advice of the alumnus, considers the Law School Fund a worthy recipient. Perhaps you, too, represent a foundation, a trust or other client that would appreciate knowing more about the Law School Fund.

BEQUEST TO THE LAW SCHOOL FUND

Yes, indeed. Another milestone. The idea of bequests to the Law School is certainly not new, but in 1969 for the first time money came directly to the Law School Fund as the named beneficiary in the will of a deceased alumnus. The thoughtful alumnus was Mr. Arthur E. Spencer, Jr., LL.B. 1924, who died in Joplin, Missouri in 1964. The gift was unrestricted and very welcome. We have not reported this bequest in

any of the other figures and statistics in this report, because it was hardly the result of a donative intent in 1969, and because we thought the addition of the amount to the proceeds to the annual giving campaign would distort the direct results of that campaign. This bequest serves as a reminder of the truth and applicability of a statement published by one of our sister law schools to show the inter-relationship of its annual giving program and bequests to the school: "Annual giving to the Fund has improved steadily—but death terminates annual giving, and annual givers must become testators who remember the Law School in their Wills."

WHY NOT

Jon L. Brown, of San Francisco, suggests that if each **contributing alumnus** would write a letter or make a telephone call to one classmate or friend who has not made a gift to the Fund, we might obtain contributions from some hitherto **non-contributing alumni**.

It sounds easy, and it might work. Do it NOW, before you forget. Since the enclosed list contains only slightly more than one-third of the alumni, you have a wide target to shoot at.



Credit on Michigan Income Tax

During 1969 we were able to assure alumni whose income is subject to the Michigan Income Tax that their gifts to the LAW SCHOOL or LAW SCHOOL FUND, *not otherwise limited as to purpose* "will be considered as being made to the General Fund of the University and, therefore, DO QUALIFY FOR THE LIMITED CREDIT PROVISION IN SECTION 260 OF THE MICHIGAN INCOME TAX STATUTE."

Without trying to get too technical here (obviously you will want to look at the statute) this meant (and means) that within the limitations of the Act the taxpayer can receive *credit* equal to 50 per cent of the aggregate amount of charitable contributions made by him to the "general fund" of institutions of higher learning located within Michigan. Basic limitations in the Act provide that the tax credit cannot exceed 20 per cent of what would otherwise have been the taxpayer's Michigan Income Tax, or \$100.00 whichever is less.

There is little doubt that many of our alumni took advantage of this tax credit provision to increase their contribution (or in some cases to make their initial contribution) to the Law School Fund. We thank you. Many more of you can do the same. Since these charitable gifts also qualify as deductions on your Federal


returns (as contrasted to the Michigan *credit*) it means that many of you can make a substantial gift to the Fund, up to \$200.00, without a very large increase in your cash outlay.

Regardless of what you feel you can give, the happy fact is that for those of you subject to the Michigan Income Tax, you can increase the pleasure of your gift to the Law School Fund by the knowledge that you can "recover" a part of it through the Tax Credit allowance.

The favorable ruling from the Department of Treasury, upon which "assurance" was based, was predicated in large part on the fact that such contributions to the Law School Fund are directly under the control of the Regents of the University, and that budget procedures for the Law School Fund follow regular University channels. No ruling has been requested concerning the qualification of gifts to the Law School for specifically designated purposes such as class memorial funds, specified scholarship or loan accounts, etc. We expect that the designation of a particular fund or specific use for many gifts will continue, and we shall gratefully accept them. But the present ruling of the Department of Treasury, as given, applies only to gifts to the Law School Fund not otherwise limited as to purpose.




