

A WISH

Even as we send you this report we are, of course, completing preparations for the 1977 *Law School Fund*, about which you will hear more. You will also hear more about the Law School's current *Capital Fund* campaign. Each has a distinctly different purpose, and the success of each fund is very important to the School. Thus, it is our sincere wish that each of you will continue, or hopefully add your support to the annual *Law School Fund* as well as participate in the *Capital campaign*. The *Law School Fund* helps us with many current needs which are truly the "extras of excellence" that keep Michigan among the world's great law schools.

AN ERROR

It has been said (with variants) that confession is good for the soul. We do not argue the wisdom of this observation rather we try hard not to make errors that need confessing. Nevertheless, in this column a year ago we made an erroneous statement that we wish to correct. Under the heading "**The Last Hurrah!**" we reported that the last two surviving members of the class of 1899 Law had died, but leaving a legacy as the only class yet to achieve 100% participation in the Law School Fund. We were correct on the latter statement, but not the former.

Much to our embarrassment, and his, we overlooked the fact that Mr. Elton R. Nellis of Westland, Michigan, a graduate in the class of '99 Law was alive and well. In fact, he still maintained an office with his son John Nellis, '31 Law, in Westland. We regret this mistake. But we are saddened now to report that Mr. Nellis passed away on December 12, 1976. Before his death he did, however, make his annual gift to the Fund, and the 100% record of '99 Law has continued for 1976.

MILESTONES

Mr. Nellis' death prompted us to take a close look at our alumni files. At the risk of being wrong once more, we believe that there are now no living members of the pre-1900 classes of the Law School. An historic milestone has been passed.

Another important milestone, which we hope will not be as singularly historic, is that for the first time total contributions to the Law School Fund in 1976 reached one-half million dollars—\$500,010.39 to be exact. More about that in a moment.

ADDRESS

Writing about surviving alumni (and the lack thereof) brings to mind another subject near and dear to us—trying to keep track of our alumni family. You probably observed the caution with which we stated our first conclusion under "Milestones." Although we try very hard to keep accurate records concerning your addresses, changes of names, and deaths, we know that some of our information is not correct. You can be of great assistance to us, and we hope that you will.

A few numbers will show the magnitude of our problem. Elsewhere in this report you will see our best guess of the number of surviving alumni in each of the several classes. The total number is now 11,417 and it increases 200 to 300 each year. Our graduating classes in recent years have been about 360 to 370, but these numbers are offset by deaths and by those we "lose" just because we no longer have a useable address. Of course, we "find" a few alumni each year, too, so the annual change in the numbers is unpredictable, except that we know it will increase.

Each year at least 25% of you will change your mailing addresses. Translated into numbers this means that we shall make approximately 2,900 changes of address during 1977—better than 11 every working day. No matter how imaginative we can be, the fact is that we have to rely upon your offices, your friends, or your families for most of our information. As one entertainer used to say at the close of his radio show—"Keep those cards and letters coming!"

OPERATING COSTS

We have not previously discussed our costs in this column, but we are cost conscious, and expenses (as well as income) are always a matter on the agenda for the annual meeting of the National Committee. Since the Law School Fund is really the collective effort and result of each of you, we thought you might like to know how much of each dollar that you and others contribute is actually an "extra" for the Law School, helping to provide what we have called "the extras of excellence."

Our cost of operation for the 1976 campaign was approximately 16.5%. We think

this is a decent figure, and, to the best of our information, is below the cost of most other comparable and successful funds. The "approximation" in our figures for last year is an accounting problem, which results from the fact that some uncertain portion of the activities of the Fund office personnel—Professor Roy Proffitt, Lois Richards, Alene Smith, and Wenda Richmon—although important to the school have a less than direct relationship to the day-to-day operation of the Fund.

A few examples should illustrate this difficulty. We have already mentioned addresses. A good address list is, of course, vital to the success of the Fund, but it is a shared asset and our office really maintains a master address list of Law School alumni for the University and for the many other Law School purposes. Doing the basic job involves secretarial time, computer time, postage, subscriptions to some of the leading lawyer directories, etc., which we do not allocate to the other users. Additionally, the staff provides all of Professor Proffitt's secretarial services. Again, a great deal of this is directly related to the operation of the Fund, but it also includes his teaching-related typing and mailing, correspondence concerning alumni meetings held in connection with a variety of the national, state and local bar meetings, and correspondence concerning class reunions, as well as his letters dealing with a wide variety of miscellaneous alumni matters, with admissions, to the families of deceased alumni, etc. The problem is knowing where to draw the line between what is proper "Fund" expense and what is not.

Happily, regardless of line drawing, and even in the face of increased postage rates, printing costs, and other such things with which you already are quite familiar, we can report that the actual dollars spent for the Fund costs in 1976, as well as the portion of gross receipts, were below the comparable figures for 1975.

1976: OUR HAPPIEST YEAR (YET)

To put it simply, we had a good year! New high marks were established in nearly every category.

We also have one new *low* mark for which we are equally pleased. In earlier years we have described a LYBUNT. This is an acronym for "Last Year BUT Not This." Our goal is to reduce the number of LYBUNTS to zero. We still have some distance to go, but our record in this category was better this year than any previous year—10.9% of the alumni who had participated in 1975. The disturbing fact is that in spite of the improvement there were still 526 alumni who had participated in the Fund in 1975 who did not do so in 1976.

KUDOS

It is risky business to single out specific areas or classes for comment because of the very wide difference in size, numbers, and previous levels of participation but a few noteworthy accomplishments would surely include:

(1) In the REGIONS, Region VII (North Central U.S.), chairman Ed Bittle and his team showed a 12.8% increase in the number of gifts, and a 91.4% increase in dollars.

(2) Among the areas with a major number of alumni (e.g. 50 or more) Berrien County, Michigan continues to be NUMBER ONE in the country with participation by 85.9% (55 of 64) of the law school alumni living or practicing there. Hats off to Chairman Elden W. Butzbaugh, Jr.!

(3) The good results from the effort of several of our loyal class agents was clearly apparent. For example this year there were 17 or more additional participants from six of the classes—1975 added 28, 1966 and 1967 each had 19 more than a year ago, 1961 had 18, and 1957 and 1974 each added 17. The names of all class chairmen and chair-women are listed in the table on page 33.

(4) Retiring "champion" Philip Wittenberg led the alumni in South Carolina to 100% participation for the SIXTH consecutive year. Kirk Grant who will be chairman in 1977 has quite a record to maintain.

Other results and leaders in a variety of categories are listed throughout the report. Our congratulations and thanks to all of you.

BEQUESTS TO THE LAW SCHOOL

Some of these bequests provided new student scholarship or student loan funds, the others permitted the money to be used within the discretion of the dean. These gifts are not reported with any other figures and statistics in the report because they were not the result of a donative intent in 1976, and because we thought the addition of the amount of the proceeds to the annual giving campaign would distort the direct results of that campaign.

These bequests serve as reminders of the truth and applicability of a statement published by one of our sister law schools to show the inter-relationship of its annual giving program and bequests to the school: "Annual giving to the Fund has improved steadily—but death terminates annual giving, and annual givers must become testators who remember the Law School in their wills."

GIFTS-IN-KIND

We have noted before that it is not uncommon to receive gifts of securities in lieu of cash. Such gifts are very welcome, and the securities usually are sold promptly and the proceeds are reflected in the cash figures that we report. Occasionally, however, we receive gifts of real value, but a little less marketable than typical securities, that are not included elsewhere in the report. The past year was no exception. Four alumni who wished ultimately to assure a substantial gift to the Law School, but with a modest cash outlay now, either purchased a new policy or transferred ownership of an existing life insurance policy to the University for the benefit of the Law School Fund. Each will continue payment of the annual premium as they become due. Each of these alumni also became a member of the Presidents Club in this way.

MATCHING AND OTHER NON-ALUMNI GIFTS

As an encouragement to charitable giving many companies and some law firms make matching gifts to the Law School Fund (as well as other donees). If you work for a company or perhaps sit on the board of directors you should check on its policy. In 1976 we received 151 matching gifts from 105 companies and firms.

Many other gifts from non-alumni are sent as memorial gifts (see details in another part of this report). A few other very substantial gifts come through charitable foundations and trusts where our alumni have a role in advising the directors or trustees; and from time to time we receive a gift from an alumnus' individual client who wishes to make a charitable contribution, and on the advice of the alumnus, considers the Law School Fund a worthy recipient. Perhaps you, too, represent a foundation, a trust, or other client that would appreciate knowing more about the Law School Fund.

Michigan Income Tax Credit

During 1976 we again were able to assure alumni whose income is subject to the Michigan Income Tax that their gifts to the LAW SCHOOL or LAW SCHOOL FUND DO QUALIFY FOR THE CREDIT PROVISION IN SECTION 260 OF THE MICHIGAN INCOME TAX STATUTE.

Thus, without trying to get too technical here (obviously you will want to look at the statute), within the limitations of the Act the taxpayer can receive *credit* equal to 50 per cent of the aggregate amount of all charitable contributions made by him or her to institutions of higher learning located within Michigan.

The section still provides that the credit cannot exceed 20 per cent of what would otherwise have been the Michigan Income Tax or \$100, whichever is less for a single person, or in the case of a husband and wife filing a joint return as provided in section 311, \$200, assuming again this sum does not exceed 20 per cent of what would otherwise have been the tax.


There is little doubt that many of our alumni took advantage of this tax credit provision to increase their contribution (or in some cases to make their initial contribution) to the Law School Fund. Many more of you can do the same. Since these charitable gifts also qualify as deductions on your Federal returns (as contrasted to the Michigan *credit*) it means that many of you can make a substantial gift to the Fund, up to \$200 or to \$400 if you file a joint return, without a very large increase in your cash outlay.

Regardless of what you feel you can give, the happy fact is that for those of you subject to the Michigan Income Tax, you can increase the pleasure of your gift to the Law School Fund by the knowledge that you can "recover" a part of it through the Tax Credit allowance.

With the advent of the Capital Fund Campaign there is the possibility that the annual giving program may be temporarily affected. However, we feel that if this should happen it will only be temporary and in the long run, will redound to the benefit of the Law School Fund program.

As I finish my stewardship of the Law School Fund, I am very happy to report that Dave Macdonald of Chicago will be taking over as National Chairman. For myself and all of those associated with the Michigan Law School Fund, we know that he will give us dedicated and strong leadership and that we are in very good hands. We offer him our congratulations and best wishes.


Dear Sam:

You should take deep pride in pushing the Law School Fund over the half million dollar mark for the first time (will you or Roy ever tell us who put in that last crucial \$10?!), and in attracting the largest number of gifts in the Fund's history, 5,512. Another figure that is at least as important is the percentage of alumni contributing annually. That has now reached the extraordinary level, for a state institution, of 44.2%. The Law School faculty and student body owe an enormous debt of gratitude to you, to your regional, state, and local chairmen and agents, and to all the generous contributors among our alumni and friends.

Two portentous developments have occurred during the sixteen-year history of the Fund, which underscore dramatically its central role in the life of the School. The annual giving campaign was started to provide significant "extras," to supplement and enrich the basic teaching and research programs of the School. Like similar funds at other institutions, annual giving has gradually been forced to assume a share of the cost of our regular ongoing operations. That is not the happiest situation — but it is far happier than some of the alternatives. Second, egalitarian state legislatures have tended in recent years to favor formula funding for public higher education. That is hard on an elite institution like Michigan, which could find its quality eroded if all colleges and universities are reduced to a common level. This risk is real enough that it makes absolutely critical substantially increased support from private sources.

Experience elsewhere indicates, as you suggest, that the annual giving program may be temporarily affected by our recently launched capital drive. We cannot allow too adverse an effect, however, or the established excellence of the Law School could be gravely jeopardized. In Dave Macdonald you have a successor as National Chairman who is worthy both of that challenge and of your legacy.


