### TWO COLLECTIONS OF BIRDS FROM CAMPECHE, MEXICO

THE late Percy W. Shufeldt followed a family tradition in ornithology established by his grandfather, Admiral Robert W. Shufeldt, who reported on the birds of the Isthmus of Tehuantepec and Nicaragua following a survey of these areas in 1871. The tradition was continued by his father, the well known ornithologist, Major Robert W. Shufeldt, and his brother, Robert W. Shufeldt 3rd, whose brief but promising career was cut short by death while he was still in his teens.

Percy Shufeldt resided for many years in southern México and northern Central America, where he had chicle and timber interests. His long residence in the lowland forest region permitted him to become very familiar with its bird life. The large and important bird collection which he amassed is noteworthy for the variety of species which it contains, for the care with which the skins were prepared, and for the information on colors of the soft parts. Unfortunately his notes were lost in the hurricane and accompanying tidal wave which devastated Belize in September, 1931. The following year he purchased La Cueva Ranch in Mora County, New Mexico. This he made his home until his death on January 27, 1949, at the age of 71 years and one month.

Later in 1949, his son, Robert W. Shufeldt, generously donated the bird collection, amounting to over 3200 skins, to the University of Michigan Museum of Zoology. For a time, the collection had been stored at the United States National Museum, where Friedmann had access to it for his work on "The Birds of North and Middle America" (Ridgway and Friedmann, 1946; Friedmann, 1950). A few specimens form the basis for records in the Mexican Check-list (Friedmann et al., 1950; Miller et al., 1957); and earlier, Oberholser had examined some of the nighthawks in the course of preparation of his monograph of the group (1914). Still, only a small proportion of the collection has

been studied and reported on. The major segments of the collection and the years in which the specimens were taken are summarized below:

The specimens from British Honduras have been studied by Stephen M. Russell in the course of preparing a major paper on the birds of that colony, and the birds from Oaxaca, nearly all of them collected at Tehuantepec, are being studied by L. C. Binford. The birds from Campeche form the major part of this report. All but a few of these birds were taken at La Tuxpeña. Of the nine other Campeche localities where Shufeldt collected, all but three are readily located: La Reforma (probably the place by that name located just over the border in the state of Tabasco), "Civatuck" (possibly Civiltic), and "Noskal."

The second collection of Campeche material herein reported consists of 192 bird skins collected by Helmuth O. Wagner between October 29 and December 10, 1946, at San José Carpizo, and purchased for the University of Michigan Museum of Zoology in 1948.

According to Wagner, San José Carpizo was an old sisal hacienda of 3500 hectares. At the time of his visit no new sisal had been planted since 1911 and the last of it had disappeared by 1920, the land being largely covered by second-growth forest 25 to 35 years old. Parts of the area were covered with dense scrub, but where the trees were taller some of the undergrowth was dying out. The vegetation was typical of the dry, limestone region—most of the trees and shrubs being leafless during the dry season. The large orchard of the finca and an old cornfield adjacent to tall second-growth were the most productive collecting stations.

Of the many species collected for the first time in Campeche by Shufeldt, a large proportion has since been recorded for that state by others. In the following list of 214 species, only those for which I have found no published records are marked with an asterisk. These amount to 32 species, of which four (Oxyura dominica, Bartramia longicauda, Erolia melanotos, and Turdus assimilis) appear to be new to the fauna of the Yucatán Peninsula. The dates of collection are

listed chronologically for each sex, the dates for the males being separated from those of the females by a semicolon. The year of collection has been omitted except in the case of one or two rare migrants when it seemed desirable to show that the species had been collected in more than one season.

#### ANNOTATED LIST

Crypturellus cinnamomeus subsp. Rufescent Tinamou.

La Tuxpeña: 266, 1 9; May 8, 16; August 2. The male taken May 8 is a downy young (wing 38 mm.); eyes light brown, feet and legs orange, bill above fleshy hue, below lighter. The colors of the soft parts of the adult pair are listed as follows: feet and legs vermilion; bill above sepia, below fleshy; eye of male Vandyke brown, eye of female steel gray.

\*Podiceps dominicus brachypterus (Chapman). Least Grebe.

La Tuxpeña: 3 & 0 & 0, 2 & 0; October 29, June 2, 25 (3). La Reforma [? Tabasco]: 1 & April 23. Noskal: 1 & June 4. The male taken October 29 and the female taken April 23 are in fresh nuptial plumage; the others are in adult winter plumage.

\*Podilymbus podiceps podiceps (Linnaeus). Pied-billed Grebe.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; August 28. In early stage of postnuptial molt; wing (arc) 138 mm.

Butorides virescens virescens (Linnaeus). Green Heron.

San José Carpizo: 19; November 10.

Florida caerulea caerulea (Linnaeus). Little Blue Heron.

La Tuxpeña: 19; October 3. In immature plumage.

\*Cairina moschata (Linnaeus). Muscovy Duck.

Xbonil:  $1\,Q$ ; November 17. Primaries worn; scattered white feathers on head and neck.

Anas discors Linnaeus. Blue-winged Teal.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; November 18. San Felipe: 1&; January 29. The November bird was in an early stage of the tail molt; the tail molt is nearly complete in the January bird, although feathers of the nuptial plumage are not yet apparent on the head and body.

\*Oxyura dominica (Linnaeus). Masked Duck.

La Tuxpeña: 1 "?!"; January 22. This bird is hen-plumaged. It appears to be the first record of the species for the Yucatán Peninsula.

Elanus leucurus majusculus Bangs and Penard. White-tailed Kite.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; May 16.

Elanoïdes forficatus yetapa (Vieillot). Swallow-tailed Kite.

Esperanza: 3 & 6 & 1 & 9; all April 17. These specimens are probably the basis for the records in Friedmann, Griscom, and Moore (1950: 49) and Friedmann (1950: 90).

Ictinia plumbea (Gmelin). Plumbeous Kitc.

La Tuxpeña: 2♀♀; April 11, May 17.

\*Accipiter striatus velox (Wilson), Sharp-shinned Hawk. La Tuxpeña: 1 \( \rightarrow \); December 9. In first-year plumage.

\*Buteo albicaudatus hypospodius Gurney. White-tailed Hawk.

San José Carpizo: 1 9; November 8. In immature plumage. Eye brown.

Buteo magnirostris conspectus (Peters). Insect Hawk.

San José Carpizo: 2 & &, 1 Q; November 4, 25; 3. The female is an adult with wing and tail in molt; eye, white-yellow; lizard in stomach. The males are in immature plumage; eyes in one yellow-gold, in other gray brown; stomach of one contained a spider "big Lycosa."

\*Buteo brachyurus fuliginosus Sclater. Short-tailed Hawk.

La Tuxpeña: 3; October 31. Adult in dark phase.

Buteo nitidus plagiatus (Schlegel). Gray Hawk.

San José Carpizo: 1 &; October 31; adult plumage. La Tuxpeña: 2 & &, 2 \ Q \ Q; May 19, August 30; May 19, 19. The male taken October 31 is in fresh plumage (wing molt not complete); testes approximately 2 mm.; eye, black brown; stomach contents "Calandria." The male taken August 30 is in fresh juvenal plumage. The immature female taken May 19 is starting to molt into adult plumage. Colors of soft parts of the adult pair taken May 19, and of the immature male are: eyes, dark brown; cere, yellow; bill, horn blue (dark horn blue in immature) above, lighter below.

Hypomorphnus urubitinga ridgwayi (Gurney). Great Black Hawk.

La Tuxpeña: 197; March. Immature plumage.

Busarellus nigricollis nigricollis (Latham). Black-collared Hawk.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; March 15. Adult plumage.

Spizaëtus ornatus vicarius Friedmann. Ornate Hawk-eagle.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; November 30. Adult plumage.

\*Circus cyaneus hudsonius (Linnaeus). Marsh Hawk.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; February 6. Adult plumage.

\*Geranospiza nigra nigra (Du Bus). Blackish Crane-hawk.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; October 29. Immature plumage. San José Carpizo: 1 &; December 2. Immature plumage. The eye of the December bird was yellow-gold; its stomach contained a frog and two lizards.

Herpetotheres cachinnans chapmani Bangs and Penard. Laughing Falcon.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; January 25. San José Carpizo: 1 Q; November 22. The wings and tail of the female are in molt; eye dark brown; stomach contents, birds.

Micrastur semitorquatus naso (Lesson). Collared Forest-falcon.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; April 5. Adult plumage. "Campeche": 1 sex ?. (No original label.) Immature plumage.

Micrastur ruficollis guerilla Cassin. Barred Forest-falcon.

La Tuxpeña: 3 & &; January 18, May 31, December 28. The December bird is in immature plumage, the two others are in adult plumage. These birds are the basis for Friedmann's record (1950: 575).

Falco rufigularis petoensis Chubb. Bat Falcon.

Chan Laguna, Choapam: 1  $\mathfrak{P}$ ? [=  $\mathfrak{F}$  on basis of size]; April 27. La Tuxpeña: 1  $\mathfrak{F}$ , 4  $\mathfrak{P}$   $\mathfrak{P}$ ; October 11; April 11, May 27, October 3, 8.

Falco sparverius sparverius Linnaeus. American Sparrow Hawk.

La Tuxpeña:  $5 \ Q \ Q$ ; October 9 to January 5. San José Carpizo:  $2 \ Q \ Q$ ; November 1, 23. The bird taken November 1 had a grasshopper in its stomach; the bird taken November 23 shows molt on the head and body.

Crax rubra rubra Linnaeus. Great Curassow.

Penelope purpurascens purpurascens Wagler. Crested Guan.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; April 13.

Ortalis vetula intermedia Peters. Plain Chachalaca.

La Tuxpeña: 2 & &, 3 QQ, 1 sex?; May 11, June 9; February 5, April 26, November 23; December 30. The female taken April 26 is a downy young with wing 65 mm. long.

Colinus nigrogularis caboti Van Tyne and Trautman. Black-throated Bobwhite. San Dimas: 2 & &; August 8.

Odontophorus guttatus (Gould). Spotted Woodquail.

La Tuxpeña: 2 3 3, 4 downy young; all May 8. The young are at most a few days old; the eyes are described as light brown, the feet and legs yellowish, the bill brownish above and below. The eyes of the adult males are brown, the feet and legs, slate blue. One has two and the other one (the opposite one is missing) primaries with whitish tips 20 to 30 mm. long, and there is considerable white at the bases of the next innermost feathers in each case.

Agriocharis ocellata (Cuvier). Ocellated Turkey.

La Tuxpeña: 6 & &, 7 & &, 9 downy young. Champoton [District]: 1 &; August 8. In juvenal plumage; wing 206 mm. San José Carpizo: 1 &; November 5. Wing still in post-juvenal molt; stomach contents: berries of palms.

The wing lengths of the downy young are as follows: 2 taken May 27, primaries just starting to grow; 1 taken May 28, wing 60 mm.; 1 June 7, 48 mm.; 1 June 11, 57 mm.; and 4 June 12, 107 to 118 mm. The wing of a downy young taken at Laguna Perdida, Petén, Guatemala, on June 2, measures 76 mm. and that of the downy young from La Palma, Tabasco, described by Brodkorb (1943: 31–32) measures 105 mm. These data, plus the statement of Legters (in Leopold, 1948) that nests of wild birds are found in May and early June and the laying season (May and early June) for captive birds in San Diego, California, given by Lint

(1952) indicates that there is little variation in the breeding season of this species.

The fine series from La Tuxpeña also provides information on the molts of the species. A female taken September 25 still has one juvenal rectrix and the wing molt has proceeded to the three outermost primaries. A female taken November 6 and a male with spurs just beginning to grow, taken December 2, are both in the process of molting the wings and tail. Three males with large spurs (26 to 33 mm. long) taken October 6 and November 12 and 24 are in fresh plumage.

Aramus guarauna dolosus Peters. Limpkin.

La Tuxpeña: 1 9; October 3. San José Carpizo: 1 9; November 1.

Aramides cajanea albiventris Lawrence. Gray-necked Wood Rail.

La Tuxpeña: 2 & &, 1 Q; March 9, April 20; June 9.

\*Gallinula chloropus cachinnans Bangs. Common Gallinule.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; January 25.

Porphyrula martinica (Linnaeus). Purple Gallinule.

Civatuck: 2 & \$ 1, 1 \, 9; all January 1. 1 in adult plumage, 1 half-way through, and the third nearly through the post-juvenal molt.

Jacana spinosa gymnostoma (Wagler). American Jacana.

La Tuxpeña: 3 & 3 & 3 & 2 & 9 & 9, May 1, October 1, 27; May 1, October 16. The female taken May 1 is in juvenal plumage; the male taken October 1 is in an early stage of the post-juvenal molt.

Charadrius vociferus vociferus Linnaeus. Killdeer.

La Tuxpeña: 3 & \$, 6 \$ \$; October 24 to December 26. San José Carpizo; 1 \$\varphi\$; November 18. Two birds (taken October 24 and December 14) have down still attached to the central tail feathers.

\*Bartramia longicauda (Bechstein). Upland Plover.

La Tuxpeña: 3 Q Q; April 9, 1910; April 25, 26, 1911. These appear to be the first records for the Yucatán Peninsula.

Tringa solitaria cinnamomea (Brewster). Solitary Sandpiper.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &, 1 9; October 1; 26. The female is clearly *cinnamomea*; the male is intermediate between this and the nominate race.

\*Capella gallinago delicata (Ord). Common Snipe.

La Tuxpeña: 1 ♂, 4 ♀♀; October 23; 23, 23, 23, 28.

Erolia minutilla (Vieillot). Least Sandpiper.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; October 11.

\*Erolia melanotos (Vieillot). Pectoral Sandpiper.

La Tuxpeña: 3  $\,$  Q  $\,$  Ç; May 15, September 28  $\,$  (2) . These appear to be the first records for the Yucatán Peninsula.

Columba flavirostris flavirostris Wagler. Red-billed Pigeon.

La Tuxpeña: 1 ♂, 1 ♀; February 23; April 11.

Columba speciosa Gmelin. Scaled Pigeon.

La Tuxpeña: 2 & & , 1 Q; August 20, November 28; May 18. The male taken November 28 is in the post-juvenal molt.

\*Zenaidura macroura carolinensis (Linnaeus). Mourning Dove.

La Tuxpeña: 2 ♀ ♀; October 17, December 11.

Zenaida asiatica asiatica (Linnaeus). White-winged Dove.

La Tuxpeña: 1 9; May 27. San José Carpizo: 2 9 9; November 1, 24. The November 1 female has nearly completed the post-juvenal molt.

Columbigallina passerina pallescens (Baird). Common Ground-Dove.

La Tuxpeña: 6 & &, 4 Q Q; 1 Q October, rest December. San José Carpizo: 1 Q; December 8.

Columbigallina talpacoti rufipennis (Bonaparte). Ruddy Ground-Dove.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &, 1 Q; January 15; May 17. San José Carpizo: 1 &; December 9.

Columbigallina minuta interrupta (Griscom). Plain-breasted Ground-Dove.

La Tuxpeña: 1 3; January 23. This appears to be the second record of this rare dove for Campeche.

Claravis pretiosa (Ferrari-Perez). Blue Ground-Dove.

La Tuxpeña: 3 ♂ ♂ , 4 ♀ ♀; October to February.

Leptotila verreauxi fulviventris Lawrence. White-tipped (White-fronted) Dove.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; December 29. Eye, "Chrome yellow." San José Carpizo: 1 &; December 5. Eye, gold.

Aratinga astec astec (Souancé). Astec Parakeet.

Pionopsitta haematotis haematotis (Sclater and Salvin). Brown-hooded Parrot.

La Tuxpeña: 1 ♀; February 13.

Pionus senilis senilis (Spix). White-crowned Parrot.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &, 3 Q Q; October 9; 9, 23, December 8. The male is a young bird with the white crown feathers of the adult plumage beginning to come in.

Amazona xantholora (Gray). Yellow-lored Parrot.

La Tuxpeña: 2 ♂ ♂, 4 ♀♀; February 13, 22; 13, 13. September 14, December 28.

Amazona albifrons nana W. deW. Miller. White-fronted Parrot.

La Tuxpeña: 9 3 3, 4 9 9, 1 sex?; January 23, 26, May 23, September 9, 13, 13, October 12, 12, November 3; May 28, September 13, October 31, November 8; April 11.

Amazona autumnalis autumnalis (Linnaeus). Yellow-cheeked Parrot.

La Tuxpeña: 1 ♀; October 12.

\*Coccyzus americanus americanus (Linnaeus). Yellow-billed Cuckoo.

La Tuxpeña: 2 & & , 1 Q; May 9, September 30; 30. These are evidently the first-recorded specimens from Campeche; Paynter (1955: 129) reports a sight record of this species from the Banco Campeche,

Piaya cayana thermophila Sclater, Squirrel Cuckoo.

La Tuxpeña: 3 & & , 2 Q Q; May 17, 28, December 4; October 6, 12. San José Carpizo: 1 & , 1 Q; November 24; December 5. & "Eye red. Stomach, insects."

Crotophaga sulcirostris sulcirostris Swainson. Groove-billed Ani.

La Tuxpeña: 3 & & , 4 Q Q; April 2, 29, December 23; May 28, December 23, 23, 23. San José Carpizo: 2 Q Q; November 20, 20. Stomach of one, "Grasshoppers."

Dromococcyx phasianellus rufigularis Lawrence, Pheasant Cuckoo.

La Tuxpeña: 1 9; October 8.

 ${\it *Tyto~alba~pratincola}$  (Bonaparte). Barn Owl.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &, 1 Q; July 25; August 10.

Otus guatemalae thompsoni Cole. Vermiculated Screech-owl.

La Tuxpeña: 1 δ, 1 Ω; May 31; 20.

Glaucidium brasilianum ridgwayi Sharpe. Ferruginous Pigmy-owl.

La Tuxpeña: 7 & &, 1 \, \( \); March 2, April 4, 5, May 31, July 13, November 22, December 4; May 19. San José Carpizo: 1 \, \( \); November 15.

\*Speotyto cunicularia hypugaea (Bonaparte). Burrowing Owl.

Esperanza: 1 9; January 31. La Tuxpeña: 3 9 9; October 17, 25, 27.

Ciccaba virgata centralis Griscom. Mottled Wood-owl.

La Tuxpeña: 4 3 3, 3 Q Q; January 7, 28, March 3, 3; January 18, February 12. November 23.

Nyctibius griseus mexicanus Nelson. Common Potoo.

La Tuxpeña: 4 & &, 1 Q; February 20, May 9, August 18, 18; February 14.

Chordeiles minor. Common Nighthawk.

The ten examples of this species taken by P. W. Shufeldt at La Tuxpeña were used by Oberholser in preparing his monograph on the genus *Chordeiles* (1914). He assigned them to subspecies as follows:

San José Carpizo: 1 \$; November 13. "Eye, black. Stomach, small insects." San Felipe: 1 \$; January 30.

\*Caprimulgus salvini badius (Bangs and Peck). Tawny-collared Nightjar.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; November 13. "Eyes, dark. Feet and legs, sepia. Bill above, dark sepia, below, same."

Campylopterus curvipennis pampa (Lesson). Wedge-tailed Sabrewing.

Anthracothorax prevostii prevostii (Lesson). Green-breasted Mango.

La Tuxpeña: 2 & &, 1 Q; February 6, June 11; 11. The males are in immature plumage.

Amazilia candida candida (Bourcier and Mulsant). White-bellied Emerald.

La Tuxpeña: 3 & &; May 27, October 1, December 14. San José Carpizo: 1 9; December 6. "Stomach insects."

Amazilia yucatanensis yucatanensis (Cabot). Fawn-breasted Hummingbird.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &, 1 Q; February 13; May 27. San José Carpizo: 1 &; November 24. Bill "coral red." Stomach contents "only insects."

Trogon massena massena Gould. Slaty-tailed Trogon.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &; May 20. "Eyes light brown. Feet and legs dark slate. Bill orange red. Eyelids salmon."

Trogon citreolus melanocephala Gould. Citreoline Trogon.

La Tuxpeña: 3 & & , 2 & & ; April 11, May 4, October 11; May 2, December 16. San José Carpizo: 4 & & , 3 & & ; November 1, 4, 24, December 4; 2, 5, 5. Stomachs of four contained "berries," one "caterpillar and berries," and one "a beetle."

Trogon collaris puella Gould. Bar-tailed Trogon.

La Tuxpeña: 3 & &; May 17, July 10, October 16.

Trogon violaceus braccatus (Cabanis and Heine). Violaceus Trogon.

La Tuxpeña: 4 & &, 1 \, ; January 26, June 7, October 8, 30; 27.

Eumomota superciliosa superciliosa (Sandbach). Turquoise-browed Motmot. San Dimas: 1 &; August 8.

Momotus momota (Linnaeus). Blue-crowned Motmot.

La Tuxpeña: 2 & & , 1 Q; May 31, October 6; 14. San José Carpizo: 2 & & , 5 Q Q; November 8, 8; 7, 8, 11, 18, 18. Eye "chestnut" in females and young male; "chestnut red" in adult male. Stomach contents "insects" (3), "beetles" (3), "beetles and dragonfly" (1).

The birds from La Tuxpeña have been identified as M. m. lessonii (Lesson) by Dr. Dale A. Zimmerman; those from San José Carpizo M. m. exiguus Ridgway or exiguus-lessonii intergrades.

Pteroglossus torquatus erythrozonus Ridgway. Collared Araçari.

La Tuxpeña: 2 \$\$,6 \$\,\text{Q}\$; May 29, October 11; May 17, June 7, October 2, 2, 18, November 26. Wings molting on birds taken May 17, 29, and June 7; tails molting, May 29, June 7, October 2 and 11. San José Carpizo: 4 \$\$\,\text{S}\$, 3 \$\,\text{Q}\$\,\text{Q}\$; October 31, November 1, 5, 17; 10, 12, 17. Eye "yellow" in all. Stomachs of four contained "berries."

Ramphastos sulfuratus sulfuratus Lesson. Keel-billed Toucan.

La Tuxpeña: 1 9; September 28, Young with bill not fully grown.

Piculus rubiginosus yucatanensis (Cabot). Golden-olive Woodpecker.

La Tuxpeña: 2 & \$, 4 Q Q; May 17, November 20; October 8, December 8, 9, 14.

Celeus castaneus (Wagler). Chestnut-colored Woodpecker.

La Tuxpeña: 2 & 3 & 3 & 9 & 9; January 26, October 8; January 26, May 24, November 13. The wings and tail of the male taken October 8 are in molt.

Dryocopus lineatus similis (Lesson). Lineated Woodpecker.

La Tuxpeña: 1 &, 1 Q; June 4; January 13. San José Carpizo: 2 Q Q; November 7, December 1. The November bird is in typical male plumage. Stomach contents of both birds "larvae of beetles." Eyes "white."

Centurus aurifrons dubius (Cabot). Golden-fronted Woodpecker.

La Tuxpeña: 4 & & , 8 & 9 &; January 5, October 18, December 14, 30; January 24, May 12, October 6, 16, November 11, 11, 20, December 29. particularly on the back. The brown immature plumage apparently is not carried into the first breeding season; a male taken May 24 is roughly three-fourths through the molt of the body feathers, the incoming blue feathers are virtually without brownish tips, the remiges and rectrices are fully grown and are blue-edged as in the adult. Two males taken February 5 and 8 at Chichén Itzá, Yucatán, and a male taken April 13 at Uaxactun, Petén, Guatemala, are considerably further along in this molt than the May bird from La Tuxpeña, retaining but a few brown feathers on the abdomen and flanks. These three birds all show narrow brown tips on the blue back feathers.
