Secondary Architectural Features *cont.*

3. The minbar: a pulpit-like structure that allows the Imam to preach to the congregation from a position visually accessible to all worshipers. Traditionally, these large, elaborate objects had a humble form, consisting of three steps. Only later, due to local cultural influences, did the minbar become a standard feature of mosque design.
